Benefits of Dual Enrollment Students have access to courses not currently offered by the high school

• Dual enrollment students may count their earned college credits both toward high school graduation and college requirements

• A head start on a college career by taking classes before students graduate from high school

• Financial savings. District pays for a certain amount of the dual enrollment class

Dual Enrollment is My Passion!

- Dual enrollment is a MISSION for me.
- I was one of the very first sponsored DE students (1996-97)
- Here's what I did with my DE credits...
- Dual Enrollment can do the same for you—and at little or NO cost!!

Dual Enrollment Facts

- Dual Enrollment is open to both public and non-public high school students.
- Funding determined by the state—public schools from foundation allowance, private schools by State directly.
- You can be sponsored for tuition, fees, and, depending on the school, possibly books. Students are responsible for any costs above the sponsored amount, and they can be sponsored for **10** courses throughout grades 9-12.
- You can enter a 4-year college as "Freshman with Advanced Standing," so ALL freshman scholarships are on the table!
- It is the student's right to do dual enrollment under the Postsecondary Act of 1996. The school or district cannot withhold DE classes unless they provide a college course on-site, or the student doesn't meet minimum test scores (English and Math ONLY.) Minimum contribution amount determined by formula.
- Students/Parents MAY also self-pay for spring/summer courses or courses exceeding the 10-course limit.

Michigan Transfer Agreement

- We STRONGLY recommend MTA courses.
- Michigan Transfer Agreement: "block" of 30 credits that transfers to any Michigan public university (if you're admitted there, C or better in each class, and complete ALL parts).
- If you know your 4-year of choice, check THEIR transfer website—you might be pleasantly surprised!
- Avoid "random acts of DE" by picking a pathway, completing the MTA, taking prerequisites for your 4-year college, extending your studies beyond AP*, or continuing at Macomb for your Associate's Degree!
- Whatever course you choose, we will be monitoring students through Macomb Success Link and communicating with HS counselors, as FERPA makes this exception. (sorry parents, no PowerSchool!)

Parents—Reconnect!

- Anyone wish to take classes, alongside their student??
- Michigan Reconnect might make it possible.
- Get started with Michigan Reconnect
- <u>Apply online for Michigan Reconnect</u>. The application takes less than five minutes to complete and can be done on a mobile phone. If you are having difficulties on your mobile device, it is recommended to use a different browser or computer.
- <u>Apply to a Michigan public community college</u>. All public community colleges, including tribal colleges, in Michigan qualify.
- <u>Submit your FAFSA</u>. This is free financial aid provided by the federal government.
- Enroll in an eligible program and start classes. You can enroll in any Pell-eligible skill certificate or associate degree program.



Process for Applying and Enrolling at Macomb Community College

- Create admission account. Apply to Macomb Community College as a **DUAL ENROLLMENT** student. Use a PERSONAL email account if possible.
- You will complete a CVHS dual enrollment request form. If sponsored, your HS counselor or school official completes a Dual Enrollment Sponsorship Form that specifies which classes will be taken and how much the district will pay.
- Once you've applied, you'll get a confirmation email.
- 1-2 days later, when your application is processed you'll get another email with steps:
- Complete New Student Orientation, 2 guided self-placement and Starting at Macomb (phone call)
- Once you finish these "admissions steps," it takes about 4 hours to get your MyMacomb password.
- Set up MFA and CHANGE YOUR PASSWORD!
- **Students** are responsible for registering for classes—not the school or district. (and de-registering)*
- After you're signed up—you MUST use/check your new Macomb CC e-mail account regularly.
- Bookstore procedures—"I am a dual enrolled student from ..."

Are your ready?

- Colleges are big places. Nothing will identify you as a dual enrollment student. You are taking courses with adults so keep your guard up.
- The typical age of a student in a Macomb class is age 25.

How do I know if I am ready for Dual Enrollment?

- Maturity plays a large factor. You must take and received scores in one of these tests to participate. Macomb's self-assessment test will also provide evidence of readiness.
- We recommend that you have As and Bs in your high school classes.
- Consider the academic history (Honors/AP)
- Consider the workload with rest of the schedule
- Keep in mind you are starting a college transcript

Please note: For the 2020-2021 school year student may qualify with a GPA. of 2.5 or higher.

Which college courses are covered under Dual Enrollment?

- 1. A course that is NOT offered at CVS.
 OR
- 2. CVHS Determined the course did NOT fit into the student's high school schedule.

Which college courses are not covered by Dual Enrollment?

 Courses that are a "hobby", craft, recreational or a course in the areas of Physical Education, Theology, Divinity or Religious Education are not eligible for tuition support.



What should I take?

- What are some examples of approved Dual Enrollment Courses? The answer depends on your future plans to play it safe take General Education type courses rather than courses in your major.
- Here are some examples of General Education courses in college.
 - Humanities
 - Philosophy
 - Sociology
 - Anthropology

Warning

The final grade from your Dual Enrollment course will be listed on your transcript but the grade won't be included in your GPA unless you select "High School and College Credit" on your Dual Enrollment Request form.



We do not provide transportation

We do not provide transportation to the colleges or from school if student arrive late or leaves early. Students have to make their own transportation arrangements



DUAL ENROLLMENT IN YOUR STATE

Dual enrollment funding The school district pays the tuition up to 1/12 of the state funding per course. The cost we paid up to this year was \$762.50 per class but can vary each year depending on state funding.

Textbooks

- The costs college text books can be funded, at least partially, by the school district. <u>You must use Macomb's</u> <u>campus bookstore.</u> It's best to go inperson for textbook purchases.
- If the district is paying for the book the book becomes the school's property. At the end of the semester, please return the text book to the Macomb Bookstore.

Communicate any course changes with counselor


 Once you have registered for your course(s). Don't make changes without talking with your counselor at CVHS.

And above all, DON'T DROP or WITHDRAW FROM YOUR COURSE(S) without talking with your CVHS counselor first.



If you drop or fail a course....

State tax dollars are involved in Dual Enrollment: if you drop the course after the 100% refund period or fail the course, the State requires the district to bill you for the cost of the course.



Make time for studying

- Be careful about 8 or 12-week courses and online classes
- College courses last about 3 or 4 hours a week and require more independent study time. A general rule: add 2 hours of study time for every hour in class each week.
 - Example: If your Humanities class is a 3-hour class each Monday, you should devote 6 extra hours of time to study for that class.



Advocate for yourself

Successful college students maintain communication with professors.

There are NO PARENT/TEACHER CONFERENCE IN COLLEGE.

Attend office hours, use email or telephone, and <u>Always seek help when needed!</u>

College professors will not talk to parents or even us due to FERPA!

Course Catalog/Class Times

Important*** Read Course Description

1. Go to Macomb's website (Macomb.edu) and select "Menu"→•then Programs and Courses and Catalogs, Courses and Classes

2. Scroll down to choose "Search for Sections"

3. Select the term (fall 2024 and winter 2025) and then Courses and Sections (alphabetical).

4. Select "Search" for Sections Now"

5. On left can filter results by campus/online and open sections. Most of our student select Center Campus. Under each course can see course description and available times.

6. Select "View Available Sections" to see the dates and times that each course is offered. Write down the course numbers of the classes you selected.

Times of Courses

 Be careful about start and end times of the college courses. Classes should start after the student's high school classes end for the day.

Your college course cannot conflict with your high school schedule, sports, band/choir or jobs. High school comes first!

Fall/Winter Schedules are NOT the same. Holiday Breaks are NOT the same. Snow day at CVHS does not equal snow day at college.





Next Steps....

- CVHS Request Form due by April 15th (Turn in one form for each semester and review Macomb catalog)
- Come to Macomb Meeting April 25th 2nd Hour (if you need help with steps)
- Macomb Steps
 - Apply to Macomb as a dual enrollment student
 - Complete online orientation, English and Math selfassessment
 - Complete Advising meeting
 - Create Macomb Account and register by May 15th
 - Email screenshot to Ms. Pitcher and let her know which high school class to drop
 - Check email regularly for further communication
